

Lord Haskins of Skidby

Lord Haskins brings a wealth of commercial, political and economic regeneration experience to his position of Humber LEP chair.

He is the former chairman of Northern Foods and Express Dairies, former Board member of Yorkshire Forward Regional Development Agency (1998-2008) and is also currently a non-executive Director of JSR Farms Ltd as well as being a member of the Lords 'Cabinet Office Equality and Reform Group Board' and Pro-Chancellor of the Open University. As well as chairing the LEP's Board meetings, Lord Haskins also leads meetings with ministers and is the LEP's voice in Whitehall and Parliament.



Graham Stuart MP

Graham Stuart has been the Conservative MP for Beverley and Holderness in East Yorkshire since May 2005. In 2010 he was elected by fellow MPs to serve as the Chairman of the House of Commons Education Select Committee, having been a member of the Committee since 2007. He founded and chaired the cross-party Fair School Funding Campaign in Parliament before being made a Minister by Theresa May last July. Graham was born in Carlisle in 1962, and attended Glenalmond College before reading Philosophy and then Law at Selwyn College, Cambridge from 1982-85. He started his publishing business at the end of his first year at Cambridge and sold the business in 2011. He is married to Anne, and they have two daughters: Sophie and Katie.



Joanna Hall HMI, Deputy Director of Schools, Ofsted

Joanna is a one of Her Majesty's Inspectors (HMI) and is Ofsted's Deputy Director Schools, overseeing the schools remit for maintained schools and academies, initial teacher education and the Local Area SEND inspections. Joanna worked with the Future of Education Inspection policy team to devise and launch the new common inspection framework and short inspection model.

Joanna has led inspections of initial teacher education, section 5 and section 8 inspections in primary and secondary schools over the last eight years. As a Senior HMI for schools based in the London team, Joanna had oversight of inspection and improvement in ten London boroughs. Joanna led 'Better Governance' conferences nationally and was the lead HMI trainer for ITE. Prior to joining HMI Joanna was senior lecturer and Head of Initial Teacher Education (Taught Programmes) at the Royal Academy of Dance, leading and managing five teacher education programmes. She has worked extensively with secondary school partnerships across London and the South East and was Chief Examiner for a national exam board. Her areas of expertise are performing arts and initial teacher education.

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Beckie Hart, Regional Director, CBI

As the CBI's director for Yorkshire and the Humber, Beckie Hart is responsible for managing and developing relationships with a wide range of organisations and stakeholders in the region; recruiting new members to the CBI; and central and regional lobbying. In addition, Beckie and her team deliver a programme of policy and best practice events for CBI members and regional stakeholders.

Beckie's responsibilities also extend to overseeing the principal representative CBI body in the region, the Regional Council, which comprises chief executives, chairmen and board members of CBI member companies from all sectors and sizes. Prior to joining the CBI, Beckie held a number of domestic and international managerial roles in small and medium sized manufacturing companies based in Yorkshire.

Beckie sits on the board of Hull Youth Bank, The University of Huddersfield Business School and the Yorkshire Customer Forum, she is married with 2 primary school age children.

Following various teaching and management roles, Bill became the college's Employer Partnership Director and oversaw the college's achievement of the Training Quality Standard - a notable first among land-based colleges. Then came a four year period with the University of Lincoln as Head of Agriculture and Land-based Studies at Riseholme College. In 2012, Riseholme's Further Education contract was awarded to Bishop Burton College following competitive tendering and Bill was appointed Vice Principal of the merged institution. He has since been heavily involved in the commissioning of the college's new multi-million pound campus on the Lincolnshire Showground.

I am an experienced manufacturing and engineering industry professional with over 25 years experience with BP, working in European, Asian and US operations. Formerly the Entity Leader for BP's Petrochemical complex in Hull, I have been successful in business because of my outstanding interpersonal and communications skills along with a strong track record of developing and leading world class, diverse teams that manage high hazard operations safely, reliably and efficiently.

I decided to leave BP in 2016 and now one of my areas of focus is to inspire more girls and women to take up STEM careers within the manufacturing and engineering businesses surrounding the Humber.
